


The Dragon Machine by Helen Ward and Wayne Anderson

Key vocabulary: apologise, boisterous, raucous, disobedient, regret, mortified,

Books to read at storytime: The dragon who didn't like fire Billy and the dragon Dragon Post



In reading lessons, look at range of letters including a pology letters.

1. Ask children what a letter is and why people write them. Show example of letter apologising for something (not model). Highlight the first person. Tier 2 vocabulary lesson:apologise, boisterous, raucous, disobedient, regret, mortified,

2. Show the children a picture on the board of naughty things the dragons could have done. Explain that there are two or more nouns you could describe – the dragon/s and the thing they interfered with. Model how to describe each noun and then make this into a sentence. Children use pictures to write 5 sentences including expanded noun phrases. E.g. The unruly dragons knocked over the tidy pencil pots. The boisterous dragons spilt milk all over the clean tables. Model that describing each noun can sometimes be too much e.g. The boisterous dragons spilt white, creamy milk all over the clean tables.

3. Ask the children what subordinating conjunctions are, can they give some examples and why do we use them in our writing. Recap when, if, because. Model use of the conjunction 'that' to explain why you feel an emotion. E.g. I am sorry that the dragons were noisy. Highlight the two clauses. I am mortified that the dragons ate all the lunch. Children write sentences using conjunction that. HAPs could use range of subordinating conjunctions. E.g. I am frustrated that the dragons didn't listen. I think that they forgot because they got too excited.

4. Explain that we will write our own letters to Mr. Rodeck pretending to be George and apologizing for what the dragons did. Model completing story map of letter choosing pictures. Learners choose pictures of things the dragons did from selection or can draw a few of their own. Then majority of the lesson retelling map using conjunctions and expanded noun phrases. Learners can annotate with words to help.

5. Write letter. Model how to set out address.

6. Continue writing letter

7. Model use of subordinating conjunctions: that, because, when, if. Re-explain/model when each is used/meaning.
Model use of sentences about pictures of children doing mischievous things using subordinating conjunctions. Extend
HAPs to try to write two sentences about a picture using different conjunction in each. Write in first person. E.g. I am sorry that I put the delicious jelly in my hair. I did it because I was feeling hot. If I wash it, I'm sure it will come out.
8. Model how to map apology letter for mischievous behaviour at a babysitter/family member's house. Provide pictures for those struggling with own ideas. Learners map and retell. Then annotate with conjunctions and expanded noun phrases.

9. Write apology letter. Model address layout and then model letter – live writing.10. Continue model.
