

- Tier 2 words:
- Discuss themes of traditional tales. Pupils box up each key event from the text.

- 13. Shared write with the class (using drama) between modern Cinderella and brothers. Model the punctuation. Learners write modern version dialogue between modern Cinderella/Colin and the family that show what they are like.
- Speech bubbles for struggling writers. 14.
- Try to encourage writers to write more than a sentence 15. Remind GD writers about adverbs and movement. per character so they know speech can be longer than one line!

- As a class, pupils look at the two versions of the same paragraph. One that has additional clauses and the one 21. that doesn't. Ask which is better and why. More is explained to the reader.
